n 2015, Moumo entered into a development lease with ChromTech Holdings, chrome producer ChromTech Holdings, to construct a loading bay and upgrade the Bleskop Railway Siding. The project is currently very close to completion, and it's expected that the siding will be in operation by the end of June.

Moumo's mandate is to create economic development on RBN land for the RBN Community. The Chromtech project has yielded both short-term and long-term economic opportunities for individuals and Small, Medium and Micro-sized Enterprises (SMMEs).

Sunette Terblanche, Process Engineer at ChromTech, has been involved in the project as a site representative for Jono Gay, Chief Commercial Officer of ChromTech, who is the Project Sponsor. She explains that the aim of the upgrade has been to develop the Bleskop Railway Siding for use as a bulk-handling and loading facility.

This means it will be suitable for loading bulk dry materials – for example, ore or minerals – for rail transport. "During the construction phase of the project, a total of about 40 temporary job opportunities were created across all skill levels,

sourcing

from local communities where possible," she says. "Several local SMMEs were awarded tenders for construction-related jobs."

Two young men from the local community were also awarded two-month on-site learnerships by the earthworks and civils contractor. This gave them exposure to some of the planning and technical aspects of construction, as well as providing valuable workplace experience.

The same contractor also provided SMMEs on site with technical support where needed. "The rail works contractor took up two candidates from the local town to be trained as potential railway patrolmen for the planned operation," says Terblanche.

"The training is provided by an accredited person and will give successful candidates with significant exposure to railway construction and maintenance."

She says that now that the siding is moving into operational phase, ChromTech has started the recruitment process to fill an estimated 10 permanent job positions. "We are aiming to fill the majority of operational vacancies with people from the local communities," she says.


"We have awarded a 12-month contract to a local security company in a joint venture with an established service provider, and will soon be awarding a 12-month contract to the successful tenderer for bulk material handling services."

ChromTech notes that further opportunities for local companies to engage with the company will include the supply of consumables like stationery, personal protection equipment and other consumables required. She adds that high priority will be given to local suppliers.

"ChromTech has allowed for the possibility of expanding the operations by adding a second phase at a later stage, depending on economic viability, which will result in more opportunities for growth and employment," she says.

"Our team at ChromTech is excited about this project and we look forward to seeing how our growth as a company can positively impact the economy of the local community."



ver hundred young people took part in the relationship dialogue under the theme - what is love. The purpose of the dialogue was to create a platform where young people can learn and share fundamentals of healthy relationships and to address the myths and misconceptions of relationships.

The youth actively participated in commissions to discuss various topics such as love in a relationship, sex and intimacy, health risks and relationship challenges among others. Their presentations were interesting as they shared different opinions about factors that make a good relationship.

In response, the social workers and clinical psychologist helped to put into perspective what good relations are all about, emphasizing values such honesty, trust, respect and open communication as necessary in building healthy relationships.

They advised young people to be aware of behaviours that can put them at risk and never to tolerate such. Young people were told to learn to always seek help if they find themselves in an unhealthy relationship.

Princess Motswana Molotlegi, also advised young people to hold on to their values saying they must always remember that "they cannot change a person no matter how much they try".

According to the Social Worker, Kabaro Neswiswa, discussions revealed that many young people still lack the skills needed to build healthy relationships.

She said many rush into dating without thinking about the consequences and how they will affect their future. "They should not base their relationships on material things like money while ignoring the consequences of their actions".

I'm pleased that our continuous engagement with them through these dialogues, will help us to connect with them and set them on the right course in pursuing healthy relationships thereby minimising the risks associated with relationships", such as pregnancy, HIV/AIDS, abuse etc.", she said.

The event was organised by the RBN's Health and Social Development Services in conjunction with Bafokeng Youth Centre, Royal Bafokeng Sports, Godisanang OVC programme and community leaders in the North East Region.

The dialogue was well received by young people who felt empowered by the discussions and asked for the programme to be expanded across other villages. Omphile Tselapedi, one of the young people strongly believes that dialogues are necessary to help minimise relationship challenges that they as the youth are facing today.

t least seven local SMMEs received certificates after completing a training program with RBED in a ceremony held at Royal Marang Hotel in June. The seven companies were the first group to benefit from the program since its inception..

Among the companies that graduated were Dikapi Cleaning Services, Faranang Business Training, Green Buds Limited, Leko Mining, Loapi Investments, Rambait Trading and Tlhago Nature Travellers.

In its efforts to promote SMMEs, RBED initiated this individualised enterprise development programme. The aim is to accelerate not only their growth but also the turnover.

By supporting the SMMEs to ensure growth, RBED believes that there's a huge potential of creation of much needed new jobs for the local community.

Admission criteria to the program requires businesses to be in operation for at least 2 years, minimum turnover of R2m per annum with high prospects for increasing turnover and a minimum of four employees among others.

The companies should also be fully compliant and registered on the RBED database. Other required documents can be obtained from the RBED offices.

More small businesses are expected to benefit from this programme which is also supported by Royal Bafokeng Holdings. The programme offers the small businesses an opportunity to continue growing and become sustainable.

he library provides services and other facilities to support educational needs of the community members of all ages.

For many years, the library has been the centre for free learning and education. Located at Phokeng Mall, the library, is easily accessible to anyone who needs information.

The library offers free internet and Wi-Fi services, typing services, photocopy and printing services, reading awareness programmes (e.g. storytelling, reading competitions, toy services, book clubs etc.) and free access to books and study space among others.

If you love reading, or currently studying, there's a variety of books available for you. All you need to do is register to become a member.

Once you have registered you can borrow two books at the time and keep them for two weeks.

Centuries later Will the youth of today "come to the party"

History tells us that Bafokeng youth in the 1800s, were already playing a pivotal role in shaping the landscapes of our society. It was during Kgosi Mokgatle's reign that the South African government of the time issued an order that inhabitants of the land had to "prove" ownership of the particular land that they are occupying otherwise they would suffer dire consequences.

At this time, Paul Kruger, then-president of the Republic, who happened to be a friend to Mokgatle, knew about the recently opened Kimberley mines. He advised his friend to take advantage of this opportunity to raise money to buy the land for his people. Like the good books say, 'it'll take the wisdom of the old and the energy of the young' – Old Mokgatle gathered his men, mostly young men, as we can imagine; and headed to Kimberley. Their earnings were later used to buy the RBN land; a legacy that will be cherished and celebrated eternally.

Records also reveal that during the 1976 Soweto youth uprising, some Bafokeng youth participated in one of the most influential political activity ever. The '76 youth fought the Apartheid system's use of Afrikaans language as a medium to education in schools. This act brought a massive landscape shift altogether and today, South Africa boosts a world-recognised, attractive and progressive education system in the world. You see this by the influx of people coming from different part of the world to study in this country.

In 2015, a movement labelled #FeesMustFall saw many young South African students standing up in unity to campaign for reasonable-to-free higher education costs – emphasising the right to education as a basic human right. Today, some of the ambassadors of the movement are sworn-in members of the Parliament. This clearly shows that young people literally have the future of this country in their hands.

Today, a young Mofokeng has opportunities to study anywhere in the world, study for any qualification of his choice, follow his/her dreams and be the best person they can ever be. A Mofokeng youth has a voice in all our traditional governance structures; an opportunity to continue to shape the future Mofokeng.

With the implementation of the MasterPlan (Plan 35) and the Fourth Industrial Revolution that is upon us, a Mofokeng youth should ask him/herself what is his role in this era. We should ask ourselves if we are ready to take the batton, run our race so that when the time comes to hand it over to the next generation, what shape would the RBN really be in.







Phoka is situated at the luxurious Royal Marang Hotel, which is placed away in the heart of the Bafokeng Nation, on the way to Sun City.


