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PLATINUM Royal Bafokeng Platinum: Listed!

8 November marked an historic day for the Royal Bafokeng Nation, with the listing of Royal Bafokeng Platinum. The float was the first time that one of the Bafokeng-controlled companies took to the Johannesburg Stock Exchange (JSE). The market responded well and the shares were all scooped up within minutes - reflecting investor confidence in the company's management, the value proposition of the company and the general South African resources market, as well as being part of a larger bullish rally on the bourse.

Steve Phiri, the Chief Executive Officer of 'RBPlat', as it will be abbreviated, said that he "welcomes new shareholders to RBPlat, which is a very, very special South African mining company". He told the media that "our journey towards this listing has been interesting and sometimes challenging. It began many years ago, towards the end of the 19th century when young Bafokeng men were sent to work on the country's diamond mines to earn money to buy their own land. Today, we

participate fully with investors and mining companies. This epitomises our vision: more than mining." Phiri promised that "we will operate our assets with integrity and as efficiently as possible, with due care for our employees, our neighbours and the environment. We aim to generate wealth and prosperity for the broadest group of stakeholders and to create value for our shareholders."

RBPlat listed on the main board of the JSE, in the 'Platinum and Precious Metals' sector. 30.05% of ownership, or equity, in the company was made available on the market, at an initial price of R60.50 a share. This offering raised R2.98 billion, which will begin to help bringing phase one of the Styldrift Merensky Project into production.

RBPlat was created from the restructuring of the Bafokeng Rasimone Platinum Mine joint venture between Royal Bafokeng Holdings (Pty. Ltd.) and Anglo Platinum (Ltd.), of which Rustenburg Platinum Mines Limited is a whollyowned subsidiary. RBPlat is touted as a "black-owned and -controlled mid-tier platinum group metals producer". With revenue that will be channelled towards the RBNDT, the company will benefit the Bafokeng morafe for years to come by helping our building of Bafokeng roads, laying of water reticulation and drainage, enhancing schools, supporting feeding schemes, funding sports development and providing employment, to name only a few. A proud day indeed!

Where there's a will, there's a way by Lekgetho Matlhaga

Ntebo Sedikwe, an partially sighted woman, is running the Chaneng Association for the Blind. The organisation was established in 2005 after Sedikwe resigned from Sun City where she worked for ten years. The organisation has, since its establishment, achieved great things. Segoagoe spoke to Mme Sedikwe, to find out more about her organisation.

What is Chaneng Association for the Blind?

Currently, our organisation operates as a Non Governmental Organisation (NGO) helping mostly blind people. Our long term vision is to be a satellite sheltered employment centre for the visually impaired.

Who are the members of the association and where do they come from?

I started working with four other blind people from the community. Currently, we have ten members, plus the three that have full sight. They are all from Chaneng village. There are other Bafokeng people from other villages who are interested in working with us, but the challenge is transport.

Who inspired you to start an organisation like this?

One day when I was listening to the radio; I heard an interview of Andrew Mkhabela, another blind person, talking about the school for the blind in Pretoria. I then decided to attend the school and study Braille and a computer course; unfortunately I was rejected because I was

diagnosed with an partial sight. I was then referred to Michael Makgoba at the same institution, who advised me to start my own project.

structure to work from. We are also

watering the garden. We also sell

vegetables, and cleaning products.

Tell us more about the products?

We are currently providing

vegetables and honey from our

its funds from?

garden and we also sell cleaning products like pine gel, bleach, 'tipi', bubble bath and "Handy Andy".

Your members are visually impaired, how do you manage to do all this work?

We work with great determination as a team. When we are, for instance, working in the vegetable garden, we assist each other where the other person cannot manage. The three sighted people that we work with also assist wherever impossible.

Where do you sell your products?

Members of the community and even people from the surrounding areas come to buy the products directly from us.

What significant achievements have you made so far?

We won Community Builder of the Year two years in 2007/2008 and again in 2009/2010. We also won in

the Bafokeng Excellence Awards for the Community Builder of the Year.

What is the biggest difficulty you encountered with your organisation?

We encounter problems when it rains because of transport and access to the garden. It can take us up to two days before we can access the project after rain.

What do you think is the best lesson you learned along the way?

When God closed the door of my sightedness, he opened another one. I never thought I could survive being blind.

Is there anything that interested readers can do to help your organisation?

- · The main thing we would like is transport for our people to access this project. We also have youth who sometimes like to help. We would like to assist them as their needs different from ours.
- We also would like an irrigation scheme to water the garden. I was inspired by one irrigation scheme I saw in Brits, I would like to see us one day having something like that in our garden.
- For now, we are only concentrating on the garden and cleaning products. We would like to participate in Cycling Competitions or the Blind, shot put, cricket as well as rugby for the blind.

Fa kgwedi ya Ngwanatsele e tlhola malatsi a le 27, sekolo sa Lebone se ne sa amogela Bakhuduthamaga, bao ba neng ba tlile moletlong wa dikalogo. Moletlo o ne o rulagantswe ke Royal Bafokeng Institute eo e leng yona e neng e katisa bakhuduthamaga ka fa tlase ga lenaneo la yona la boeteledipele.

Fa a ne a tshwaela ka maikaelelo a moletlo, Dr Charles Mironko wa RBI Leadership Programme, o ne a re, lenaneo la boeteledi pele ke go tiisa mokgwa wa puso ya setso wa Bafokeng ka go matlafatsa Bakhuduthamaga gore ba kgone go lebana ka katlego le diphetogo mo lefatsheng. Ka go rialo, lenaneo la boeteledi-pele, le ne la tsweletsa katiso mo maphateng a tshwana le Best Administrative and Leadership Practicesga mmogo le In-Community Circle Dialogues, moo baeteledi-pele le maloko a Morafe a neng a kopana, le go rulaganya mmogo dintlha tseo di lebaneng le dikomiti go ya ka dikgaolo tsa bona.
