# **KIMBERLEY PILGRIMAGE**



nce again, members of community are invited to take part in the life-changing journey that tells of our remarkable story as Bafokeng Nation – Kimberley Pilgrimage on Saturday, 17 August. This journey is undertaken every three years is in commemoration of our forefathers who went to work in the Kimberley diamond mines in the late 1800s in order to buy land.

When one thinks of the Royal Bafokeng Nation – probably the first thing that comes to mind is "Platinum". This is because of the large deposit of this minerals group vastly found on the RBN land.

However, many people might not know that before platinum reef was discovered here, sacrifices had to be made. It was during the reign of Kgosi Mokgatle, around the 1860s when diamond was discovered in Kimberley. At the same time, Paul Kruger was president of the Zuid Afrikaanse Republiek.

The policies of that time indicated Black people were not allowed to own the land. Naturally, for Kgosi Mokgatle, Phokeng was home to him and his people since their ancestors have been living in the region for many years.

Relations between Paul Kruger and Mokgatle were reasonable and that was a blessing because Paul Kruger was able to advise Mokgatle to buy the land and acquire title deeds so that should conditions in the country be rife, Mokgatle and his people would rest assured because they would be in full possession of their land's title deeds.

This then birthed the idea of sending men to the newly discovered diamond mines to go and work, so as to raise funds to finance the buying of the Phokeng land. Kgosi Mokgatle then sent regimen from Phokeng to Kimberley, 540 kilometers barefooted, they trekked into unknown territories.

One can only imagine the challenges that they met on their way; dangerous wild animals, severe weather conditions, possibilities of getting lost on the way, limited access to food and water.

However Mokgatle's men were unstoppable. They had a dream and were determined. At that time, there were no modern transport modes, they relied only on the strength of their God-given resources to get them there – their feet! It is said that men would work on 6-months to a year contract at the mines.

This meant for a whole year plus several weeks of travelling they would be far away from their families. Upon arrival, they would contribute their earnings to the kitty that would later be used to buy the communal Bafokengland.

Back at home, women and youth would also work hard raising capital to contribute to buying the land. Agricultural produce would be sold and money raised from that would go in the kitty.

Go tloga kwaa Lowe, Bafokeng have always believed in collaborations and working together for the benefit of all. At the same time that Mokgatle sent his men to Kimberley, German missionaries had started to work among the Bafokeng people.

The Hermansburg Mission Station was established at what is now Saron section in Phokeng. Among some of the work that they did was to establish a school where Bafokeng were taught to read and write, as well as better ways of farming.

Kgosi Mokgatle collaborated with the Missionaries under the leadership of Christopher Penzhorn to buy the land, have it registered under the name of the missionaries with the agreement that as soon as the country's laws allow, the ownership would be returned to Bafokeng people.

In 1866, August the 18th the first title deed of the Bafokeng land was signed. Men continued to trek to Kimberley to work at the mines until several farms were purchased for the community.

It was about 30 years after the death of Kgosi Mokgatle that platinum group metals were discovered in the Merensky reef – largely in the Bafokeng region.

The Royal Bafokeng Nation today celebrates and commemorate the heroic visionary selfless leadership of Kgosi Mokgatle and the generation of men and women whose sacrifices brought life, hope and achieved dreams for this generation and those to come.

It is on these grounds that this year, Bafokeng take a pilgrimage to Kimberley Big Hole in commemoration of Bafokeng regimen who worked in the Kimberley mines during the 1800's. The money that they earned at these mines was later used to buy the Bafokeng land. This year will be the 153rd year since the signing of the first title deed of the Bafokeng land on 18 August 1866.

Transport is arranged to leave Phokeng early in the morning of Saturday 17th and travel back in the evening. The cost for the trip is R460 and R230.00 for pensioners and youth between 18 and 20yrs.

This year an arrangement has been made for those wishing to sleep over in Kimberley and travel back on Sunday morning. Members can contact the office or pay a deposit of R100.00 to book their accommodation at the following hotels:



n the early 1990s, an Italian professor by the name of Corrado Fogher started to improve a well-known tobacco plant with the aim of expanding and diversifying its use from that of smoking. A decade later, he had created what is known today as Solaris, a nicotine-free tobacco variety plant with a highly improved seed yield.

This ground-breaking initiative led to the formation of Sunchem. It was founded in 2007 in the Netherlands as the company that would develop the use of Solaris. It has since grown its footprint into Sub-Saharan Africa to further its strategic objectives in developing Solaris.

Together with its partners (Boeing, South African Airways and SkyNRG), Sunchem came to Moumo's attention when it successfully undertook Africa's first biofuel flight in 2016. Moumo has since partnered with Sunchem to investigate the possibility of farming Solaris on RBN land with the aim of diversifying RBN's reliance on mining.

Through this partnership, Sunchem and Moumo have initiated a pilot project to assess the potential of commercially cultivating this tobacco variety in the Royal Bafokeng community.

The pilot project includes the employment of local farmers who will be trained in all aspects of growing Solaris.

#### Why Solaris?

Moumo's mandate is to create economic development on RBN land for the RBN Community.

If the Solaris pilot proves effective and the project is scaled to a commercial level, it could prove an immensely productive use of RBN land. Farming Solaris will also create jobs, opportunities to manufacture animal feed and many other indirect opportunities for Bafokeng farmers.

The project has synergies with other Moumo farming projects (such as the cattle farming project) and is well aligned with RBN's Plan 35

"We at Sunchem believe that Solaris can be a valuable contribution to the Vision for 2035 of the Royal Bafokeng Nation," says Samantha Hampton, who heads up Business Development and Sustainability at Sunchem.

"The introduction of Solaris has the potential of an increased output due to its higher seed and biomass yield compared to soy and sunflower.

The oil is a feed ingredient or can be converted to biodiesel to increase sustainability of the mining industry. The press cake and biomass have a feed purpose."

Mr Motswe, who is a sunflower farmer and part of the pilot project, believes the Solaris Project is a golden opportunity for the community. "There is great potential in growing this crop," he says. "I am hoping to hear from Moumo in the next few months that I can go ahead and plant more hectares."

Mr Gift Kanengoni, a farm manager working for Modiegi Tumagole, one of the other farmers involved in the pilot project, agrees. "This is a good opportunity to develop my farming skills and that of my colleagues. That knowledge gained is invaluable. Tobacco is a simple crop to grow. We are grateful for the opportunity to be part of the pilot and we want to work towards vast goals for this region."

#### Setting Up The Pilot Project

Although Solaris seems to be an ideal crop for the Phokeng and greater North West region, implementing the pilot project has not been plain sailing. Nevertheless, the challenges have been addressed through committed partnership. All parties involved are optimistic about the viability of growing the Solaris Project into a commercial venture in the long term.

Mrs Tumisang Njikelane is the Moumo representative working with the farmers and Sunchem to manage the project locally. She was previously an agricultural advisor to RBN, which meant she is well-placed to identify farmers to take part in the pilot project. She explains that both dry and irrigated lands were targeted to ascertain the viability of the project, given that Phokeng is known as a water scarce area.

The pilot project commenced in Oct 2018 and should be completed by the end of March 2019. It has been a challenging journey with numerous obstacles. One of the challenges has been ensuring the right equipment has been available where it's needed, when it's needed, given the locations of the farms. The strong collaborative efforts between Sunchem, Moumo and the farmers have enabled the project to maintain continuity.

Another challenge has been timing. Mr Motswe says that farming Solaris on dry land proved challenging and that his first crop failed on the back of the drought in the region. He planted a second crop near Groot Marico, which has been successful.

Mr Kanengoni, who has managed crops of onions, spinach and other vegetables previously, says that Tumagole's tobacco crop also took a beating thanks to an intense hail storm in December 2018, but thankfully it survived and is currently thriving. He notes that

Sunchem has provided much needed mentoring on managing the Solaris crops, and that it is the simplest crop he's ever farmed.

Moumo ensured that the funding for the project was spent in the local community, resulting in 27 work opportunities being created within the pilot project. With their training in growing the Solaris crop, the participating farmers are now well placed for the commercial phase of the project.

#### **Scaling The Project**

If all goes according to plan and the pilot is declared a success, Moumo and Sunchem will identify various areas suitable to grow Solaris on a commercial scale.

As some of the Impala mining shafts are closed and handed back to RBN, the idea is to divert the water and land from these shafts to farm Solaris. In the long term, the aim is to establish an agricultural processing hub in the region, creating jobs and economic opportunities. Sunchem, together with the Dutch Good Growth Fund, are interested in funding this commercial rollout.

The pilot project will also be showcased at an event hosted by Sunchem and Moumo together with the Dutch Ambassador and visitors from the Dutch funders on 26 February.

Njikelane says that as the project scales, Moumo will begin to approach additional farmers who meet project criteria to join the programme. "We'll be looking for people with land and access to water, who are committed and passionate about farming".

oung people in the North East Region are gearing up for the dialogue to be hosted by the department of Health and Social Development Services on 18 May.

The dialogue is targeting young people from the ages of 18 to 35 who are either dating or not, in intimate relationships or thinking about stable relationships in the future.

The purpose of the dialogue is to create a platform where young people can learn and share fundamentals of healthy relationships and to address the myths and misconceptions of relationships.

Building on the success and the lessons learned from the annual marriage seminars, the department saw the need to include young people in the dialogues.

"We realised during the marriage seminars that we have been focussing on couples who have long been in relationships and left out the young ones. So in order to make a lasting positive contribution into future strong families, we must engage young people to give them guidance as they get into relationships", said Kabaro Neswiswa, social worker in the department.

Neswiswa added that many young people have misconceptions about relationships; some believe that having a baby is a way to fix relationship problems while some commit into long term relationships with a hope that their partner will change their behaviour once they are married. As a result, they live in unhealthy relationships. "Marriage comes with responsibilities, therefore couples at the early stages of their relationships, must be prepared and guided to deal with any other issue that may burden them before they consider making the big step", she said.

"Marriage Comes with Responsibilities" Lack of relevant platforms and awareness on healthy relationships are said to contribute to people staying toolong in challen-

ging relationships or rather transferring problems from one relationship to the next. The dialogue is seen as a step or a bridge towards achieving healthy relationships.

Young adults are encouraged to attend this dialogue and use the opportunity to engage the social workers, psychologists and other professionals about the fundamentals of relationships and get insight in how to solve any challenge they come across.

In close partnership with the communities, the department through its family care programme is committed to developing innovative ways to reach out to families including teenagers to enable them to make the right decisions about their future.



# ROAD MAINTENANCE ON BAFOKENG ROADS

fficient public utilities are essential to support the development of our community and to cater for our anticipated population growth. Such utilities include the provision of drinking water, electricity, roads, sanitation, waste management, and housing.

InfraCo is the RBN's infrastructure project commissioning and management arm. It aims to develop high-quality, effective public utility infrastructure and services to serve our community.

Road maintenance forms a major part of infrastructure spend and workload. Its main objective is to upgrade and maintain earth works structures including roads, storm water structures and landscaping in all areas of the Bafokeng. The table below shows the amount of work achieved in the past year.


