**Communications and Curriculum Department** and **Refiloe Rankoko** (who is qualified in Translation and Language Practice) attended the North West Language Practitioners' Association (NOWLPA) workshop in Potchefstroom recently.

The aim of the workshop was to provide network database and support for language practitioners and the development of language expertise in the North West Province and to facilitate collaboration and interaction between language practitioners from the North West Province and other parts of SA. The workshop introduced and familiarised translators and interpreters with the *Autshumato translation software* developed by the Centre for Text Technology (CTexT®). The software will assist in language development and in particular in the development of indigenous languages. With this software the Communications and Curriculum Department hopes to create a Setswana dictionary, so that all Bafokeng and entities use similar words and terminilogy when translating documents. The workshop focused on Setswana, English and Afrikaans combinations.

The attendees of the workshop were encouraged to become members of NOWLPA in order for RBI to represent the language practitioners of the North West Province and promote their interests as well as those of the profession.

**Eileen O' Connor** took part in the *Subaru Kalahari Challenge* on 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> July in Botswana.

The challenge took place from Gaborone to Lobatse. There were approximately 400 entrants who had to cycle in teams of two; teams were not allowed to finish the race without their partners.

Eileen and her team mates lined up on the Saturday morning ready to cycle 98km. The first day of the race went really well for Eileen and her partner finishing in 6 hours 20min. The team then had an overnight stop in the mountains where the temperature dropped to -2; even the bicycle saddles and water bottles froze! Day two of the race was even more daunting than day 1, as Eileen and her partner mounted their iron ponies for another grueling 100km – they completed the course in 7hours. Eileen said "this was the most physically challenging event I have ever competed in my cycling life".

Eileen found cycling through the thick Botswana bush invigorating and totally awesome! Her encounter with the children from Botswana was amazing; young kids were cheering the riders along.

Eileen, being one of few female riders, got some strange looks when she came down the path pushing hard; she surprised many supporters and many still think she was crazy for participating. The water points were manned by the local people who treated the riders like kings and queens. The riders were given oranges, bananas, jelly babies, sandwiches and muffins, and provided with water and energy drinks to wash the dust down!

The event was sponsored by the Botswana Tourism Board and made Eileen think this could be done here in Phokeng. Overall, the team managed to finish in 4<sup>th</sup> position in the mixed category.

**Some wise words that inspire Lesego:** "Everything in life happens for a reason and the things you go through, whether good or bad, make you a better and stronger person".




Who would win a fight between Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal? Rafael Nadal-. As of 1 August 2011), he is ranked no 2 by the ATP.
