Essential Oils

Project manager: Motlapele Tumagole



Agriculture is an important component of Royal Bafokeng Enterprise Development's (RBED) economic development plan. In the RBN, agriculture focuses primarily on cattle grazing, irrigated sunflower production and small emerging operations in intense agriculture, such as vegetables, pigs, goats and poultry. Another agricultural activity supported by RBED is the plantation of rose geranium for the production of essential oils.

A multi-facetted project, such as this one, requires time, proper planning and a detailed business- and project plan. Factors to consider in these plans include training of all who will be involved, infrastructural planning, planting and monitoring, harvesting and distillation, marketing, contractual agreements with buyers and selling the product. It is envisioned that the project will be converted to a programme upon completion of the first phase of the project to ensure a long term revenue stream and job opportunities for all involved in the venture.

Geranium planting and the eventual production of oils from them needs time, lots of effort, patience and determination. Initially, the first phase of the project was to run from June 2009 and end December 2010, but due to challenges faced during the implementation of the project, this phase was delayed.

Currently the project is faced with challenges such as unfavourable weather conditions. Planting requires very specific conditions; the project manager noted that "during very hot weeks the soil becomes hard and dry and when it rains, working in a wet soil is difficult so conditions must be such that it's not too hot or too wet". Despite these challenges, the RBED has every intention of completing this project and are confident that the programme will have long term benefits for the Bafokeng Morafe.

There is no doubt that investment in agriculture could potentially result in a multitude of benefits to the RBN in the form of creating work and revenue opportunities to those involved. We look forward to the future of Bafokeng Essential oils!

Product and skills development: Art and Crafters

Royal Bafokeng Enterprise Development (RBED) is charged with developing entrepreneurship in the Bafokeng Nation. One way that it hopes to accomplish this is by initiating product- and skills development.

Recently, the RBED appointed Aid to Artisans South Africa (ATASA) Trust to assist in executing an 'Arts and Crafters' project. ATASA is a South African not for profit trust, established in 1976, that offers key services to the local craft industry. These services include, among others, the African market readiness programme, customized training programmes, product development and designing, and market access. In this particular project, six Bafokeng SMMEs were identified to be trained by ATASA; these were, by name, Nkutona, Modisa ke Monyatsi, Bo Mkhozi Projects, Brotherly Love, Atlegang Arts and Moitoi Creations.



The project ran over a period of five and half months where these enthusiastic groups primarily attended skills development workshops, all facilitated by the ATASA Trust. By the end of the project, the six SMMEs had gained technical and production skills, improved product development knowledge, project management skills and background on how to gain access to markets. The group leader from Moitoi suggested that "ATASA Trust has opened another world of business approach to us".

The overall objectives of this project was to facilitate collaborative skills development for crafters in the Bafokeng region, to economically empower these crafters through improved market access and sales, and to support, mentor and instil an eye for entrepreneurship among them that can ensure ongoing product development with current and new craft enterprises in the area. The consensus is that this goal was achieved.



"Product and skills development: Arts and crafters" is one way of showing our commitment toward the Bafokeng recognizing and developing people's skills. Congratulations to Motlapele Tumagole, her team from RBED and the ATASA Trust for the effort taken to assist the Royal Bafokeng Nation in its attempt to achieve its vision of a self sustaining community.

 - Project managers needs to posses leadership skills in order to enhance the completion of project tasks.
 - Proactive management and reporting of issues and risks related to the project.
 - Selection of the resources to deliver on the scope of the project.
 - Cash flow management during the implementation of the project to avoid over spending on the budgets amounts.
- What do you recommend as essential skills that each project manager should have in order to be successful?
 - Management skills Holistic project viewing to see the impact that project would have on the entity RBN and Vision 2020. Financial analysis to evaluation the financial implication of the decision on project implementation.
 - People management skills ability to motivate and sustain people during the project life span. It is key to be able to manage multi functional team members
 - Coping skills ability to handle unforeseen situations, Conflict, disasters and uncertainty during the implementation.

The role of a Project Manager

The Project Manager is the person who takes *overall responsibility for coordinating* a project, regardless of its size, to *make sure the desired end result comes in* on *time* and *within budget*. (Baker, Baker and Campbell)

In summary the project manager will:

- Develop a project plan that describes the complexity of the project;
- Mentally "fast forward" the activities required to complete the project to calculate the duration of the project;
- Ensure that all the agreed upon objectives are reached on completion of the project; and
- Continuously check the progress of the set objectives against the agreed upon project plan. (Pycraft, Singh, & Phihlela)
